SYMPHONIC RESIDENTIAL PIPE ORGANS

The other night, on PBS, there was a special on restoration projects. One of the topics was a report on the restoration of "Symphonic Residential Pipe Organs" built between WW1 and WW2. It was truly fascinating. These were custom organs built for the rich and famous and were installed in their homes. An interesting note is that these organs could be played with paper roll programs like a player piano. The restoration was being done in Boston. They demonstrated a large organ composed of two original instruments. It has three keyboards and over 100 ranks including every TOY instrument you could think of. This organ is located at Boston University, it's in complete operating condition and has sound chambers that are over 100 feet long and 40 feet high. It's open to the public.
